Fellowship of Christian Military Ministries (FCMM) 2025 Annual Conference

March 24-26, 2025 at Springs Church, Colorado Springs

The 2025 FCMM Conference took place on March 24 - 26, 2025 and was held at Springs Church, Colorado Springs CO. The theme was **"Serving Together for the Gospel in the Military Society:** *Digging Deep into the Chaplain – Church – Parachurch Partnership.*" The host for the conference was Officers' Christian Fellowship

Pre-conference Gatherings – Monday Morning & Afternoon

- Fellowship for Executive Directors of FCMM Nine Host Ministries This gathering was hosted in the Conference Room, David C. Cook Building from 8:30am-1:00pm. The meeting included a time of fellowship followed by a business meeting and lunch. Participants in the fellowship were Scott Fisher (Officers' Christian Fellowship), Marty McCarty (Club Beyond/MCYM), Kathi Jo Orr (Christian Military Fellowship), David Phillips (Cru Military), Gary Sanders (Military Missions Network), David Schroeder (Cadence International), Linda Sheimo (Olive Branch International), and Terry Wichert (Association for Christian Conferences, Teaching and Service). Joining them for the business meeting and lunch was a representative from the other host ministry: John Fitzgerald (Navigators Military & First Responder), and Debbie Culpepper (MMN) to record minutes.
- 2. Women's Fellowship Lunch This gathering was held from 12:00am-2:00pm in the home of Esme' Daetz (Navigators Military & First Responder). Fourteen ladies attended.
- **3.** The 2026 Conference Planning Team (CPT) This meeting took place from 1:30-2:30pm at Springs Church, Classroom 1. The following individuals participated:

- 4. **Newcomers Orientation** This session introduces those who are new to the FCMM. This session was held at Springs Church Classroom 2 from 3:15-3:45pm. Sign up for this session was not required. Twenty-seven conferees attended.

Participants

A total of 85 individuals attended for the conference representing 33 ministries and churches (plus 7 guests for Monday evening dinner). Another 32 guests joined the Tuesday morning Pastors and Chaplain Session, including 4 Chaplains and representing 23 additional ministries and churches. The Community Dinner on Tuesday evening was enjoyed by 148 which include the 85 conferees joined by 63 guests, including 3 Chaplains, and representing 8 additional ministries and churches. *Note: Thirteen dinner guests also attended the Pastor and Chaplain's Session on Tuesday morning*.

Session Summaries Prepared by Officers' Christian Fellowship

Bottom Line Up Front: The purpose of the FCMM is to focus the efforts of the various military ministries through prayer and cooperation as they join in God's work at various locations around the world. The format of the conference along with the opportunities to connect in person ensured this purpose was accomplished.

MONDAY, MARCH 24

Opening Session (4:00 - 5:00 PM)

The focus of this session was to provide an overview for the conference and also help provide connection amongst the attendees. **Scott Fisher**, *CEO/Executive Director*, *Officers' Christian Fellowship* provided opening comments and introduced the theme. **Gary Sanders**, *Founder and President*, *Military Missions Network* led this session by introducing the representatives and leaders of each ministry and having them introduce their respective teams.

Welcome Dinner (6:00 PM)

The Opening Dinner featured guest speaker Opening Remarks and Speaker Introduction by **Chet Arnold**, *COO/Deputy Executive Director*, *Officers' Christian Fellowship*. Guest speaker **Augustin Tchenkoua**, *Cru Military Director of Military Ministry Cameroon and Cru Military Area Operations Director for Africa*. His topic was "**God's Work through the Pastors, Chaplains, and Parachurch in Africa**." MCFs exist in many African countries. He provided examples of groups trained in several countries. He also addressed challenges and how the audience can help with his efforts. Closing Remarks and Prayer were offered by **Colin Wooten**, *Director of Field Operations*, *Officers' Christian Fellowship*.

TUESDAY, MARCH 25

Prayer, Worship, and Devotional (8:30 - 9:00 AM)

The session began with prayer by **Scott Fisher**, *CEO/Executive Director*, *Officers' Christian Fellowship* followed by a time of Worship led by the Spring Church Worship Team.

Devotional was led by **Doug Lee**, *President, International Association of Evangelical Chaplains*, **"The Call on our Lives."** Scripture reference was Psalm 144:1-2; 1 Samuel 17:47 "The battle is the Lord's." There are two calls: a call to Christ and the call for how we use our new lives in Christ. Acknowledge God who gave us the privilege to serve Him.

Session One (9:00 AM - 12:00PM) Chaplain/Pastor Focus

Opening Remarks were moderated by Kristin Goodrich, Severn Leadership Group Mentor.

"Chaplain Spotlight" featured Ch (Col) Chris Conklin, USAF, Peterson SFB, NORAD/

NORTHCOM. He addressed the mission of NORAD/NORTHCOM, the future environment, religious leader engagement and the military's needs from local churches. The future environment presents the possibility of large numbers of casualties--Russia and China in particular. Consider what to do to support families of those who have been killed or wounded, including casualty notification, while supporting forward deployed military units with chaplain support. Taking care of families is a huge

concern for service members, especially when deployed. In the event most or all chaplains are deployed, local pastors need to pick up support for military families, to include support for the wounded and, in coordination with the military, notification teams. Clergy need to be the rock and anchors when community disasters occur including logistics, volunteers, and faith support. You know where vulnerable populations are. Local churches provide the bulk of support for military families who are increasingly off installation.

Local ministers need to:

- 1. Develop good followers of Christ.
- 2. Reach out to active duty, Reserve and Guard chaplains.
- 3. Send missionaries to the military.
- 4. Ask followers to worship at the base chapel a couple of times a month.
- 5. Preach the Gospel

"Pastor Spotlight" by presented by **Tung Le**, *Pastor, Lake City Community Church, Lakewood, WA*. He spoke on **"Building Up an Effective Military Ministry."** There are three key aspects: Culture, Intentionality and Partnerships. Consider the military a mission field. For culture, learn the language and culture of the military. Hire retired service members on your staff. Intentionally incorporate military-specific ministries, events and programs. Also, ensure there are quick on-ramps for new families to engage in the life and ministries of the church. Lower barriers to involvement. Establish partnerships with mission-aligned parachurch organizations. Bottom line: Don't see military as interlopers and passing through, but as missionaries who will go back out into the military.

Following the presentations, a panel discussion with three key ministry leaders was moderated by **Kristin Goodrich**, *Severn Leadership Group Mentor*. Panelists: **Mark Gauthier**, *Military Ministry, Joint Base Lewis McChord*, **Ch (Lt Col) Doug Hess**, **USAF**, *Chaplain*, *Peterson SFB*, and **Joe Adams**, *Pastor, Manna Church*, *Colorado Springs*. The panel addressed 3 Segments

- 1. Strategic Overview,
- 2. Operational Mindset
- 3. Tactical, boots on the ground

The session was a facilitated discussion through intentional questions of the panel members. The panel then responded to moderated questions from conference attendees.

"Working Partnerships Spotlight" The final morning session was presented by **Gary Sanders**, *Founder and President, Military Missions Network*. He provided a definition of **Working Partnerships in Missional Military Ministry** *as "An established relationship and partnership in which at least one military ministry and one local church are actively engaged together to mutually help each party more effectively accomplish their respective mission in gospel-centered military outreach and ministry. The goal is kingdom synergy.*" He shared that he is working on a white paper on the topic of working partnerships where he has been conducting interviews with pastors and ministry leaders regarding *best practices. We looked at Ecclesiastes* 4:9-12 "...*a threefold cord is not quickly broken,"* relating the 3 cords of the military believer, the military ministry, and the local church. He concluded that churches are the sleeping giant in the military community that should be awakened and the question "Can you be missional if you aren't intentional?"

Following the speakers and panel discussion, we split into table groups, held discussions and provided the large group with key points addressed at each table. Afterwards, we enjoyed lunch together.

Session Two (1:00 - 4:00 PM) – Parachurch Focus

Four topics were presented with the opportunity for questions from the audience.

1. Environmental Scan Collaboration

Ryan Wainwright, *Assistant Director of Field Operations*, *Officers' Christian Fellowship*, provided a summary of survey results from input provided by FCMM attendees prior to the Conference. His presentation included the areas of greatest need, challenges reaching the military, emerging trends and how the military community can better partner with chaplains and local churches. Suggestions for better partnering included:

- a. Learn what chaplains feel is important and how we can fill the gaps.
- b. Recognize your need to help chaplains accomplish the mission, not just look for access.
- c. Churches have more to offer than just financial support. They must earn trust and cast a vision.
- d. Encourage involvement in local churches for military members.

- 2. Organizational Fundraising vs. local fund raising presented by David Phillips, *Executive Director, Cru Military*. He focused on four elements necessary for successful organizational fund raising:
 - a. You need a minimum of three staff working on fundraising.
 - b. Develop a compelling message that resonates with the audience and is from the heart.
 - c. Build relationships and trust.
 - d. Pray consistently and incorporate lessons learned.
- **3.** International Ministry presented by Terry Wichert, *Executive Director, ACCTS*. He addressed three aspects of international Ministry:
 - a. God's Word Why the Nations?
 - b. God's World Where do we go?
 - c. God's Work What to do?

Terry concluded with other observations:

- a. Jesus understood culture but did not obsess over it.
- b. Culture doesn't define a person: ethnicity, family of origin, personality and the military culture also.
- c. The best teaching comes out of listening and learning.
- d. Blessing precedes influence.
- e. Be an agent of God's blessing.

He summarized suggesting an approach of: Sending, Welcoming, Going and Praying

- 4. Non-Federal Entity presented by Bill Stackhouse, Director of Strategic Initiatives, Club Beyond/Military Community Youth Ministries. Bill addressed:
 - a. The Current DoD Operating Environment
 - b. Applicability of NFE On-Installation
 - c. Various NFE Partnership Types
 - d. He concluded by offering his expertise to help other organizations.

Community Dinner, 6:00 PM

Conferees and guests spent time interacting around ministry display tables before and after dinner. Guests were also provided gift bags by the Community Dinner sponsoring ministries.

Opening Remarks by **Scott Fisher**, *CEO/Executive Director*, *Officers' Christian Fellowship* Dinner speaker was **Dr. Jerry White**, *International President Emeritus*, *The Navigators*. His topic was **The Chaplain**, **the Church**, **and the Parachurch Serving Together for the Gospel in the Military Society**.

Closing Remarks and Prayer were provided by **Scott Fisher**, *CEO/Executive Director*, *Officers' Christian Fellowship*. Invest in the military as they will be with you in eternity, not just passing through. We are called to share the Gospel in a broken world.

The evening concluded with fellowship and networking.

His message concluded that we need to encourage each other that we are doing a beautiful thing. We are all doing our part and working together more can be accomplished.

Session Three (9:00 -11:15 AM) Collaborative Time

Ministry Collaboration Spotlight

ROTC ministry **"Raising up the Next Generation of Christian Military Leaders — Together"** was presented by **Larry Sherbondy**, *Navigators Military & First Responder Staff Serving as Director of ROTC Ministry, Officers' Christian Fellowship.* Larry explained that what used to be rivalries and competitions is now collaboration in the ROTC ministry. He described how ROTC ministries partner together, why it works and the opportunities for the audience to become involved in ROTC ministry. Suggested opportunities include:

- 1. Intentionally become a "pastor" to ROTC Commanders, their staffs and cadets (Ref. Chap Hess' comments yesterday). There are only 1 or 2 Chaplains for the whole Cadet Command!
- 2. Send people to engage with cadets, part-time and full-time to evangelize and disciple them.

Following his presentation, there were **Table Discussions**. Each table was asked to come up with three takeaways from the previous sessions, which were then shared with the group.

- 2. David and Joyce Schroeder: Gary led in a time of recognition and appreciation for David and Joyce Schroeder. The Schroeders are transitioning from their current roles with Cadence International. In July of 2025 David will have served 30 years as President of Cadence. Under his leadership Cadence has served as the host ministry for the FCMM Conference 6 times. He has attended the FCMM Conference 28 of his 30 years as president. He has provided leadership and influence within the FCMM. Survey of FCMM 2025 Registrants As part of the FCMM registration process, a voluntary survey was available from January 6 to March 4, 2025.

40 registrants initiated the survey. 32 provided some input. 28 provided complete responses.

- Parachurch ministries: 14 leaders, 5 staff, 2 volunteers
- Military chaplains: 2
- Churches: 2 leaders, 2 staff, 1 volunteer



Summary of Survey Responses

- The greatest spiritual needs among those in the military community today are <u>spiritual growth</u> and <u>community</u>.
- The biggest challenges to reaching military members are <u>access</u> and their generally <u>fast pace of life</u>.
- Ministries are aware of cultural threats and have begun <u>adapting</u> <u>policies and communications</u>.
- There are multiple opportunities for collaboration between churches, chapels, and parachurch military ministries.



What are the greatest spiritual needs of those in the military community today?

Top response categories: spiritual growth; Christian fellowship; strong families

- "Beyond [salvation], and in terms of military life and service, the younger generations of troops need leadership, guidance, and mentorship from those over them." parachurch ministry staff
- "In-person fellowship. Via the local church, supporting ministries, and knowing there are fellow believers in the military... e.g., one is not isolated." parachurch ministry leader
- "Genuine community and fellowship, especially in the midst of deployments/separations, transitions, and loss." – parachurch ministry leader
- "Creating a Godly, adaptable family; a clear Gospel message that's applicable to real life." military chaplain


What are your ministry's *biggest challenges* in reaching military members?

Top response categories: access to servicemembers; pace/tempo of military life; too few in ministry

- "It is a challenge to get onto the local bases to access the military members who need it." church staff
- "Having access and knowledge of members in transition and knowing when new Christian leaders arrive." – parachurch ministry leader
- "pace/tempo...life is super-busy, so getting them to realize their needs and the opportunities available to them." – parachurch ministry leader
- "Not having enough leaders and mentors who are willing to invest in the younger troops." parachurch ministry staff

What changes have you or your ministry made in response to societal, political and/or *legal pressure* in the past 3-5 years?

Top response categories: assessed and adapted policies; adjusted communications; refined some ministry approaches

- "Annual training to chaplains on religious liberty issues. Developed/ published guidelines for chaplains on providing ministry to LGBT Service Members." – church leader
- "Monitoring surface area for attack on external messaging and internal procedures." parachurch ministry leader
- "More use of online technologies, especially for communications." parachurch ministry leader
- "Renewed emphasis and resourcing on intentionally engaging those in our ministry face to face." parachurch ministry leader



What *emerging* trends or policies in the military community are you observing that may present new opportunities (or challenges) for military ministry?

Top response categories: changing national/DoD policies; military chaplains and chapels; anti-Christian worldview

- "Drastic changes within DoD have produced some anxiety and fear regarding a new military culture." church leader
- "The increased, laser-like re-focus upon warfighting capabilities." military chaplain
- "Closing doors to chapels; encouraging families to worship off-post." parachurch ministry staff
- "Personal identity, same-sex marriage, etc. I find they have more questions within these households than I ever imagined." parachurch ministry leader



How can parachurch ministries to the military community better *partner* with chaplains and local churches?

Top responses categories: build relationships with chaplains; build relationships with churches; assist with chapel/church ministry

- "Knowing what Chaplains and local Churches feel are important and showing them how particular parachurch ministries can fill these gaps."
 – parachurch ministry leader
- "Recognize that you must help a chaplain accomplish his mission, not just look for access he can provide." parachurch ministry staff
- "Recognize churches have more to offer than just financial support...must be a part of a local church to earn trust & cast vision." – parachurch ministry staff
- "In the midst of our own parachurch ministry we need to [point servicemembers] toward membership and activity in healthy local churches." – military chaplain



What are you observing regarding financial *support* for ministry to the military community?

Top response categories: difficult/declining; donors are interested and responsive; younger donors are less likely to give

- "Financial support has declined for all ministry, not just ministry to the military community." parachurch ministry leader
- "It appears to be flat-lined, maybe decreasing." church leader
- "Those who know the community support it generously. Many are not aware of the opportunity." parachurch ministry leader
- "Older generation that actually have experienced combat are more likely to give...as they die off, the younger generation isn't as motivated." – parachurch ministry staff




How have technological changes in the last 3-5 years impacted your ministry? How have you adapted your ministry efforts in response to those changes?

- "We are doing more computer-based meetings." parachurch ministry leader

- "We are slow to adapt technology changes and have not kept up with what is available." parachurch ministry staff
- "We are developing a new app to allow greater community regardless of location and we are able to provide digital products at less cost." – parachurch ministry leader



Fellowship of Christian Military Ministries (FCMM) The Purpose of the Annual Conference

Purpose of the Conference

The primary purpose of the conference is to provide associated ministry leaders an annual opportunity to spend time together for networking, partnering, fellowship, support, and inspiration.

The FCMM, and its annual conference, are first and foremost about building relationships with other like-minded spiritual leaders for mutual encouragement and collaboration.

Since the annual conference is planned for leaders of FCMM-associated ministries, it is not promoted publicly but rather in-house and by word of mouth. Guests are welcome to attend at the invitation of involved leaders from associated ministries.

The conference begins on Monday and ends by noon on Wednesday. The standard start date for the conference each year is the last Monday in March unless Easter falls early, in which case the conference is planned for earlier in the month. Host ministries have latitude for adjusting the conference dates in March as needed. Additional pre- and post-conference meetings can be added with approval from the Conference Planning Team (CPT). The conference is held each year in a strategic military location in the U.S.

Associated ministries are engaged in both national and international military ministry, all with a view to see God's heart to reach all nations with the gospel and fulfill His Great Commission. As such, consideration with some application should be made each year to both a national and international focus by the CPT.

Purpose of the Community Dinner

Normally each year in conjunction with the annual conference a Community Dinner is held in the same local area. The purpose of the Community Dinner is to provide opportunities for networking among the military, military ministries, churches, chaplains, and other like-minded ministries. Host ministries not only plan the event as a session of the annual conference but also as a gathering which is open to interested individuals from the community. Specific purposes for the Community Dinner include:

- 1. To provide introduction of FCMM associated ministries in general, recognize sponsor ministries of the dinner, and to convey in spirit the benefits of partnership and collaboration in military ministry.
- 2. To inspire and challenge ministry leaders from FCMM associated ministries.
- 3. To encourage military believers regarding the calling to serve Christ through military life and society.

Indigenous military believers are the most powerful component of gospel-centered movements among military people and communities.

- 4. To increase awareness of the importance of the local region in terms of U.S. and international military presence and strategy.
- 5. To cast vision to churches regarding the strategic nature of gospel-centered ministry to military people and Great Commission impact through military believers.

The military sub-culture or "people group" is a dominant presence in the particular region and thus missional military ministry provides a primary avenue for the church to strategically advance the gospel within and from the region.

6. To promote a greater mission-synergy through intentional collaborative efforts between military chaplains, military believers, military ministries, and gospel-centered churches.

So much more could be accomplished in this important arena if like-minded parties worked together in a more purposeful way!

The Structure of the Conference Planning Team (CPT)

The Conference Planning Team (CPT) oversees the Annual Conference. The CPT consists of the Executive Leader of the immediate past, present, and future conference host ministries and the Corresponding Secretary. The CPT meets each year at the Annual Conference.

For each given year the CPT is expanded with duly selected individuals who actually do the work of planning the Annual Conference and will contain the following individuals:

- Host ministry conference planner(s) for the current year's annual conference (Lead/Decision Maker role). Additional reps from the host ministry will often join the CPT for their given host year.
- 2. Host ministry conference planner(s) for the forthcoming year's annual conference **(Observation role, pre-planning phase)**.
- 3. Host ministry conference planner(s) from the previous year's annual conference **(Advisor role)**. Participation on the CPT for this individual(s) would involve the initial planning meetings and then on an as needed basis for advice and assistance.
- 4. The FCMM Corresponding Secretary (CS) will participate in CPT meetings and related conversations as needed throughout the planning process (Admin/Support role).
- 5. Additional rep(s) from other FCMM associated ministries or other experts in the field may be invited to participate on the CPT by the host ministry of the current year (Partner role). Additional reps serving on the CPT for a given year are utilized for planning and leadership but do not attend the CPT meeting at the annual conference or participate in related administrative decisions relating to the CPT.

The CS will initiate communication for the CPT planning process for each given year and regarding the meeting at the annual conference. Soon after the annual conference, the CS will initiate contact with any CPT members who are new to FCMM and the annual conference for an orientation discussion.
